Call to Order	Ms. Hess at 11:05 AM (EST)

Introduction	Ms. Hess reviewed agenda items for the meeting via a PowerPoint presentation (see www.floridahats.org/wp-content/uploads/2009/10/Microsoft-PowerPoint-FloridaHATS_5-25-10.pdf). Topic highlights, key points and discussion items from the presentation are outlined below.

Topic	<u>Training For Professionals</u>
Key Points	Dr. Reiss reviewed the development of training for healthcare professionals through ICHP. The curriculum is targeted to all professionals who have interaction or provide support to youth and young adults with chronic health conditions and disabilities; it provides free CEUs and CMEs to a broad range of professionals. The online training is structured in 2x 2-hour modules and will be available for the next 2 years through Gulfcoast AHEC. A promotional brochure has been developed and will be distributed by hard copy and electronically; promotion will also include articles in newsletters and publications. Questions Answers Actions	(Q) Does this CME support the Maintenance of Certification (MOC) Part 2 requirement for pediatricians? (A) We don't know but will investigate whether/how the training can qualify for MOC. (Q) Where do community pediatricians look to find CMEs? (A) A lot go through the AAP <i>Action: Task Force members will help promote the training in their respective organizations, e.g., APD, CMS providers, County Health Departments, Internal Medicine/Family Medicine associations, etc.</i> <i>Action: Ms. Hess will explore MOC requirements and posting the training on the AAP website.</i>
Topic	<u>Local/Regional Coalitions</u>
Key Points	Ms. Hess reviewed the MAPP Planning Guide, which was adapted for health care transition issues and was designed to help guide coalitions in planning for local systems of care. There were 3 pilots: HillsboroughHATS, JaxHATS, and PanhandleHATS. Dr. Wood outlined the JaxHATS coalition planning process, and Ms. Kelly reviewed the HillsboroughHATS process. Ms. Hess commented that PanhandleHATS experienced some unique challenges as a rural area, and will focus next year on expanding participation throughout the region, particularly in Pensacola.
Questions Answers Actions	(Q) How is the JaxHATS program structured and how is it working with CMS? (A) Dr. Wood explained that, because of funding from CMS, JaxHATS has a clinical program that has been working for 4-5 years. Approximately 400 youths are enrolled, and receive primary care, transitional education and support. There is nurse coordinator that regularly meets with CMS nurses to coordinate case transfers. Topic	<u>Insurance Options</u>
Key Points	Ms. Hess reviewed the new publication "Just the Facts, The 411 on Health Insurance for Young Adults Ages 18-30 in Florida." It is posted on the web site at www.floridahats.org/wp-content/uploads/2009/10/JUST-THE-FACTS_Final-Low-Res.pdf . Some hard copies will be printed and it will be translated to Spanish and Creole. Dr. Sloyer commented that the guide is very appropriate for benefit counselors, care coordinators, or other advocates who can walk youth, young adults and families through the process to let them know what is available in Florida and help them make the right choice.

Topic	<u>Upcoming Year</u>
Key points	FloridaHATS anticipates continued financial support from CMS and FDDC for 2010-2011. Planned activities include developing a FloridaHATS promotional brochure to get the word out about the program and its resources; renew the professional training module; continue to support 3 pilot coalitions as they begin implementation of their strategic plans; evaluate the local planning process; develop an online service directory that provides listings on services and resources by geographic area; establish a presence in social venues like Facebook and Twitter; and reintroduce a legislative proposal in the 2011 session to formalize FloridaHATS and create a State Advisory Board. The Task Force will continue to meet next year via Webinars/teleconferences, face-to-face meetings, and ad hoc working groups (e.g., clinical guidelines, legislation, etc.)
Questions Answers Actions	<p><i>Action: Dr. Wood and Ms. Hess will organize a group shortly to work on clinical guidelines.
